Officiating Program

Registration

Registration is now open for all Officials 17 and Under as well as Modules for Senior and High-Performance Officials will open next week.

Please visit the Hockey Saskatchewan website at <u>https://hockeysask.ca/officials/registration</u> to determine what is required for each age group which includes online registration, a virtual clinic, on-ice sessions, etc.

There will be close to 100 on-ice clinics held to provide easy access for officials to complete their certification. These onice clinics begin the middle of September and run till the end of December.

Junior Officials that would regularly pay either \$80 or \$128 depending if they are registered as a player or not, will be able to register for \$50 or \$98.

The mileage rate for Hockey Saskatchewan was raised from \$.042/km to \$0.45/km

Recruitment

To assist in the recruitment of Officials, a social media add campaign will be launched in the coming weeks so watch for that on Hockey Saskatchewan social media channels.

In addition, MHA's will be sent posters and videos to share with their members and general public to assist in the recruitment of people into the officiating ranks and increase registration numbers.

With what has transpired at the Hockey Canada level over the past five months it is important to provide some clarification on a few items:

Hockey Canada Fee Structure

Hockey Saskatchewan charges a \$48.00 per participant fee to all players, team officials and officials throughout the province. The Hockey Canada portion is broken down as follows

The National Equity Fund

- The National Equity Fund is a fund that was created in 1986 to provide insurance to our Members, as a means for Hockey Canada to support anyone who might have been injured or harmed where insurance policies were insufficient.
- Since that time, it has grown to fund a broad range of safety, wellbeing, and wellness initiatives across our organization. This includes, but is not limited to, insurance, counselling and treatment for players, concussion research grants to the Canadian Hockey League, criminal record checks of Hockey Canada staff, as well as safety initiatives. These represent about 95% of the fund payments since 1995.
- The fund is also used to pay uninsured claims that are not covered by insurance policies.
- The status of the National Equity Fund is reported to our Membership (Branches) at <u>every</u> Congress and a budget is presented annually. The notes to the most recent financial statements state: *"The National Equity Fund Balance has been accumulated as precaution against judgments that may be made against the organization as a result of current or future claims."* It has also been reported and audited in Hockey Canada financial statements since the early 1990s.





The National Equity Fund (Continued)

- It is standard insurance industry practice for an insurance policy to cover certain claims and not others. As with any liability insurance that is purchased, there are always unforeseen circumstances where some claims are not insured. The fund is also used to pay these amounts.
- How many sexual abuse claims have been settled through the fund?

From 2000-2021, there have been nine uninsured payments to nine sexual assault victims out of this fund, totaling \$7.6 million. These payments represent 3.7 per cent of all disbursements (including insurance premiums) made over the same period.

These payments were made to these victims in recognition of the harm caused, and to support their well-being and needs.

Three known perpetrators are responsible for all nine of these cases and related payments: Graham James (5), Gordon Stuckless (2) and Brian Shaw (2). Graham James' settlements make up \$6.8 million (89 per cent) of the total paid out to victims. These were historical claims, which pre-dated our insurance policy, and as a result were not covered.





The Health and Benefit Trust Fund

All fees collected for Medical and Dental along with Accidental Death and Dismemberment, a total of \$7.15, is allocated to this fund.

The Medical and Dental side is not covered through an Insurance Company. Hockey Canada is "self insured" in this area and has established limits of payment for specific claims and these claims are paid from this fund. Examples would be dental claims, ambulance rides, physiotherapy. This coverage acts as a "secondary" payer to whatever coverage a family may already have through an employer for example.

The Accidental Death and Dismemberment side is covered by an Insurance Policy through a Broker and the premiums for the coverage are paid from this fund. Examples of claims in this area are deaths to and from or during games; loss of eyesight; paralysis; etc.





Potential virtual call with Hockey Canada Senior Leadership

The Senior Leadership of Hockey Canada have offered to host a virtual call with Member MHA's of Branches across the country. AAA/AA Male and Female Committee Review Procedure (Continued)

Annual Procedure Timeline and Responsibilities

- November 15 December 15
- Hockey Saskatchewan Staff gather current and historical registration data; report on what the current landscape is within the province along with expected trends and issues and reports it to the Committee members.
- Committee meets to determine the following and make Recommendation to the Board of Directors by January 1:
 - Whether to expand an age division and by how many teams and identify potential areas
 - Whether to move specific sponsoring centers of current teams to provide greater access to membership
 - Whether to remove any current teams

• January 1 - 15

Hockey Saskatchewan Board of Directors review Committee Recommendations and approve next action

• January 15 – February 15

Committee implements any action approved by the Board of Directors such as:

- o Call to the membership accepting applications for additional teams within an age group and category
- o Advise MHA's the sponsoring center of a team will be moved
- Advise MHA's a team(s) will be removed from their location
- February 15 March 1

Committee reviews applications for additional teams within an age group and category and make recommendation to the Board of Directors

Hockey Saskatchewan Board of Directors review Committee recommendations and approve any they wish to implement

AAA/AA Male and Female Committee Review Procedure (Continued)

AA 15-Year-Old Provincial League

The Hockey Saskatchewan Board of Directors have approved the creation of a Provincial 15-year-old Male League for the 2023/24 season.

• Work will begin this fall with the Committee outlined above to proceed with the creation of this League.

Provincial Junior Female League

Preliminary work has been completed on the creation of a Provincial Female Junior League. In discussions last week with MHA's interested in the project it was felt that it should be a priority of Hockey Saskatchewan to have the League in place and promote it this winter in anticipation of creating the League for the 2023/24 season.

Hockey Saskatchewan Equity, Diversity & Inclusion (ED&I) project

As we reported in May, the following highlights from an ED&I Project in the spring, a Committee has been tasked to continue work on developing strategies to assist MHA's in these areas:

The most important elements that are taken into consideration when registering for a sport or activity are:

- *Developmental opportunities to become a better player* considered most important by parents of children who play and current players;
- A welcoming atmosphere considered most important by parents of children who have quit playing; and,
- Whether there are qualified/good coaches considered most important by parents of children who play, urban residents, and parents of children who have quit playing.

There will be further reporting on this initiative during the season within these calls.
